Centrality of parking to hospital care

- Hospitals and health services being rationalised into fewer, larger units serving wider areas (<u>Lucas 2006</u>)
- Benefits in centralising services improved clinical outcomes in some specialties (<u>Hunter et al, 2013</u>, <u>2018</u>; <u>Eichler et al, 2014</u>)
- Larger units need more land and often located in more peripheral areas
- Increasingly in places that are difficult to access without a car
- Access is more than getting there cost, time, ease, safety
- Intersectional differences in experiences of access gender, disability, ethnicity, age
- Lucas et al (2019) found that 66% if elderly people are unable to reach a hospital within 30 minutes by public transport

The problems with free parking

- 1. Inequitable
- 2. Reinforces (and subsidises) the unsustainable increase in private car use and the associated negative environmental and physical health sequelae



Forced car ownership

- When people have little alternative to buying a car in order to access opportunities, such as employment (<u>Mattioli, 2017</u>)
- As a result of:
 - Geography
 - Temporalities of public transport
- Care work in hospitals (particularly shift work) at the intersection of these
- The consequences of forced car ownership are particularly significant for lower income groups


Forced car ownership

- Who makes up the NHS?
- Includes low-income workers
- A band 5 nurse £6000 real-time pay cut over the past decade (<u>Nursing</u> <u>Notes, 2018</u>)
- For low income groups, costs of running a car result deprivation in other areas life (<u>Lucas et al, 2016</u>)
- NHS staff most likely to rely on payday loans (Nursing Notes, 2018)
- <u>Survey of 3000 nurses</u> 39% skipped meals to feed family/save money
- Lower-income groups suffer most from the externalities of car-centric development (<u>Cassasco and Lucas, 2019; Lucas et al, 2016</u>)

Reinforces and subsidises private car use

- Free parking subsidises those who drive
- Car and taxi traffic on UK roads is growing annually
- UK road transport contributes <u>one fifth of our GHG emissions</u>
- Climate change <u>expected to have extensive detrimental health</u> <u>outcomes</u>
- Air pollution is the <u>biggest environmental health risk across Europe</u>
- Association between traffic related air pollution hospital admissions
- Many UK hospitals are in areas where PM2.5 exceeds safe and legal levels (<u>BLF, 2018</u>)


